2009 NCNMLG AWARD FOR PROFESSIONAL EXCELLENCE

On behalf of the NCNMLG Awards and Honors Committee, I am happy to announce that Peggy Tahir is the recipient of the 2009 NCNMLG award for Professional Excellence. The award will be presented at the NCNMLG Meeting on March 5, 3-5pm, at Kaiser Oakland. Dinner will follow the meeting.

Peggy has been an active and contributing member of NCNMLG since she joined in 1988. She was elected President of the group in 1992, and has served

on the Executive Board in some capacity for most of the last seventeen years. Her many contributions to NCNMLG include serving as the MLA Nominating Committee Nominee; as a member of the Long Range Planning Committee; chair of the Web Redesign Taskforce and subsequently the chair of the Electronic Resource Committee; editor of the newsletter; member of taskforces working on an online CE survey and the E-Bay fundraising auction; and last, but not least, Peggy has been serving since 2003 as the PSRML Representative for the chapter. In addition, she was chair of the Roundtables sessions at the 2004 Joint Meeting in Sacramento; chair of Contributed Papers at the 2008 Joint Meeting in Las Vegas; and she has presented many papers and posters at Joint meetings.

In the broader arena, Peggy also joined the San Francisco Biomedical Library Network in 1988. Her contributions to that group include serving as Secretary and twice as the Coordinator. Nationally, she has been on the MLANET editorial board and was a member of the MLA Web Site Hosting Taskforce.

She has also presented a number of papers and posters at various Medical Library Association conferences. Internationally, she has served on the International Federation of Library Associations (IFLA) Science and Technology Standing Committee since 2003.

Peggy currently holds the position of Public Services Manager at the UCSF Library and Center for Knowledge Management. She also is an Adjunct Professor at City College of San Francisco, where she teaches a class, "Medical Resources and Libraries". Her prior positions were as the manager of the libraries at Children's Hospital and the California Pacific Medical Center, both in San Francisco; and as Information Resource Manager/Webmaster for Healthcare Forum Inc.

As her nomination letter states, "Her career represents opportunities that she actively sought which enriched her influence on the profession. Peggy has spent over 20 years working to improve the practice and status of medical librarians with an energetic zeal and infectious personality. NCNMLG COMMUNICATIONS TASK FORCE UPDATE

The idea for the Communications Task Force came out of a brainstorming session at the August 15, 2008 chapter meeting in Berkeley. It began with a discussion about starting a FaceBook or LinkedIn group to facilitate chapter communication. The idea grew and resulted in President Locke Morrisey's call for an ad hoc committee to investigate how NCNMLG communicates currently and how that could be improved. Three of us volunteered for the task force: Amy Andres (UCSF Fresno), Mina Davenport (Children's Hospital Oakland), and me (San Francisco General Hospital). Our job was to analyze what is and isn't working in terms of communication, get ideas from our members and other MLA chapters, and present some possible solutions in the form of a final report prior to the MLA annual meeting in Hawaii.

At a face-to-face meeting at a Turlock restaurant where, thanks to a gracious wait staff and a slow business day, we enjoyed a 2 ½ hour lunch where we got acquainted, discussed our approach, established ground rules, and decided on a division of labor. My job was to set up a [wiki](#) for internal collaboration and to conduct informational interviews with chapter committee chair and officers. Mina would take a look at how MLGSCA and other chapters communicate, and Amy would design and distribute an online survey and collect the results.

To gather officer and committee chair opinions about their current communication practices and better understand the duties they perform, I interviewed 12 individuals either face-to-face or by phone or email, taking notes on the conversations and recording them in the wiki on the Brainstorming page.

Amy sent a 5-question Survey Monkey survey to the listserv. She received a total of 48 responses, giving us some significant data to work with as well as many helpful comments.

The following are some common themes and generalities that run through the information we've gathered so far:

- We don't like email and think of it as a time-waster but still see it as the most expedient method for communication.
- We prefer face-to-face communication but don't have the time or funding for it.
- Some of us are in favor of implementing Web 2.0 tools ("We have to stay on top of

the technology if we expect to recruit new members to the profession") and some are not ("Please...no blogs or wikis. Anything you have to sign into is a nuisance")

Stay tuned for our final report which (we think) will be presented at the March 5, 2009 meeting at Kaiser in Oakland. However, we're still interested in your observations and opinions regarding our chapter's communication practices, so please contact Mina, Amy or me if you'd like to give input. Or... you Web 2.0 people can go to our [wiki](#) and post a comment, also called a "thread".

Anyone who has used PubMed regularly has noticed some of the many changes. This PubMed® class is of particular interest to those who want a review of recent changes to the system, including medical librarians, researchers, medical editors, and anyone who searches for biomedical journal article citations.

This full-day class is designed to teach students how to use PubMed® which includes MEDLINE citations. The class also includes an overview of the Medical

Subject Headings (MeSH®) and its importance as a tool to both searchers and indexers.

[TOXNET® and Beyond](#) (6 MLA CE Hours)

This full-day class is designed to convey the basics of searching NLM's TOXNET®, a Web-based system of databases in the areas of toxicology, environmental health, and related subjects. Students learn the content and structure of files covering toxicology data, toxicology literature, toxic releases, and chemical searching and nomenclature.

Among the databases highlighted will be TOXLINE®, the Hazardous Substances Data Bank, the Integrated Risk Information System, the Toxic Release Inventory, and ChemIDplus.

All the training sessions are FREE and intended for health sciences library staff, public librarians, health professionals, and anyone interested in using these free National Library of Medicine (NLM) databases.

PUBMED CLINICS: A PROBLEM-BASED APPROACH TO PUBMED SEARCHING WORKSHOPS OFFERED FEBRUARY 25TH AND 26TH

Kay Deeney of the Pacific Southwest Region of NN/LM will be teaching two PubMed workshops in California in February. One will be held on February 25th in Downey and the second will be held on February 26th. Entitled *PubMed Clinics of North America: A Problem-based Approach to PubMed Searching*, the three-four hour workshops will focus on a problem-based approach in learning to search the PubMed database. Through case studies, group exercises and hands-on practice, participants will become more efficient PubMed searchers. The class is geared for intermediate and advanced PubMed searchers.

Participants will be able to:

- Search PubMed to locate citations on challenging author, subject or keyword, and institutional searches;
- Create a search strategy using the strengths of the database;
- Apply MeSH headings to enhance a search;
- Use MyNCBI to create collections and save searches (the 2/26 class only);

- Become familiar with available tools to update their skills and for lifelong learning.

My NCBI now has a new page where libraries can select the services they wish to share with their users. PubMed Filters, Document Delivery, Outside Tool and Highlighting settings can be selected on this page by clicking the check boxes. Only the selected settings will be shared.

NLM DIETARY SUPPLEMENTS LABELS DATABASE UPDATED

The National Library of Medicine's [Dietary Supplements Labels Database](#) includes information from the labels of over 3,000 brands of dietary supplements in the marketplace, including vitamins, minerals, herbs or other botanicals, amino acids, and other specialty supplements. Information in the database is based on the Dietary Supplements On-Line Database (DSOL) ©2005-2009 by DeLima Associates.

The database is designed to help both the general public and health care providers find information about ingredients in brand-name products, including name, form, active and inactive ingredients, amount of active ingredient/unit, manufacturer/distributor information, suggested dose, label claims, warnings, percentage of daily value, and further label information.

The Dietary Supplements Labels Database now includes several interface improvements, more products, and an auto-complete (search) feature.

Other recent additions/changes include:

- * Search box on every page
- * Age/gender categories under “Products”
- * Glossary page with A-Z anchor links
- * Updated FDA Recalls, FDA MedWatch and FTC Actions

- * More products (3000)
- * New “Help” page.

Links to other NLM resources, such as MedlinePlus and PubMed, are provided for additional health information. Links to related Fact Sheets from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, Office of Dietary Supplements, National Center for Complementary and Alternative Medicine, and the National Cancer Institute are also available.

FEBRUARY IS CHILDREN'S DENTAL HEALTH MONTH!

The Maternal and Child Health Library at Georgetown University, in collaboration with the National Maternal and Child Oral Health Resource Center (OHRC), released a new edition of the knowledge path about oral health for infants, children, adolescents, and pregnant women. Presented in time for Children's Dental Health Month, this electronic guide points to resources that analyze data, describe effective programs, and report on policy and research aimed at improving access to and the quality of oral health care. The knowledge path contains sections with resources for professionals, resources for
